# Diversity Committee Presents: The History of Kwanzaa: Submitted by Marcia Posner

During this time of year, many enjoy Christmas to celebrate the birth of Jesus; many celebrate Chanukah to remember the miracle of the oil that burned for eight days when only one day's amount had remained; still others celebrate Kwanzaa to .....??? How many of us really know what this holiday is all about? The Diversity Committee, that has chosen to learn about our African-American neighbors, decided we need to know more about this event that takes place December 26 through January 1.

Kwanzaa is not a religious celebration but one of the harvest; the name means "first fruits." (Reminds this writer of the Jewish holiday of Sukkot). In 1966, Professor Maulana Karenga founded this holiday to create unity among the African-Americans, which, he believed, was lacking after the riots in Watts in 1965. He created it by combining a variety of African harvest celebrations.

### The Swahili and African symbols:

Kinara candle holder, Straw mat, Corn, Kwanzaa flag, Unity cup

### The principles upon which Professor Karenga founded Kwanzaa:

Unity, Self-determination, Collective work and responsibility, Cooperative economics, Purpose, Creativity, Faith

Each candle of the kinara represents these principles and most families weave the importance of the African culture into the celebration; many wear traditional African garb during the lighting and feasting of fruits, nuts, vegetables—with corn being of special importance, as it represents children.

Although there is no religious significance to Kwanzaa, the symbol of the Christmas tree and other Christmas symbols are maintained in the home of the African-Americans. We are alike holding close to us our special traditions: Christmas, Chanukah, Kwanza bring together families to celebrate with colors of red, green (Christmas), red, green and black (Kwanzaa), blue and white (Chanukah); traditional foods; special symbols; and stories of the history of their people. We should learn about and appreciate each one. The folk singers Peter, Paul and Mary wrote and sang about the importance of diversity and unity, as they stated in one of many songs: "Well, I've got a hammer/And I've got a bell/And I've got a song to sing/All over this land/...It's a song about love between/My brothers and my sisters/All over this land..."

Whatever you celebrate, we wish you joy and good health in the new year. Maybe share your holiday traditions with others who celebrate different ones. (This writer has been to several Christmas celebrations in Christian and Catholic churches, decorated many Christmas trees, and has watched her two Catholic sons-in-law and daughter-in-law take part in the lightning of the Chanukah candles.) One day, all of us might see first-hand the celebration that is important to our African-American friends, Kwanzaa.

# **Advocacy/Public Policy News**Co-VP's, Advocacy - Bev Fallik and Jennifer Ingram

## **Legislation: From Bev Fallik, Co-VP, Advocacy**

Nov 2016 Legislative Updates:

Joan researched the 2016 written testimony and discovered that there was only one opponent of the bill. Other support came from individuals, community colleges and the MD women's legislators' caucus.

Bev spoke extensively with the MLAW lawyer who is lobbyist for another group. She provided excellent advice regarding critical people for support (Hausner and Dumais) and recommended researching legislation Dumais sponsored in order to understand her priorities. The committee research (Joan, Marcia and Bev) of Dumais' bills is underway. We will be meeting w/ Ms. Lifson once that is completed. We will also be checking in again with Ms Hausner (the co-chair of the Family Law section of the MD Bar Assoc.). We are also further researching studies that support our position. Anita Rosen (State Policy VP) is going to speak w/ NOW to see if they will join our effort. Any help obtaining other organizations' support would be welcomed.

We still have not received a response from Delegate Hill regarding the newly revised bill. Bev will be contacting her again. We may need to consider alternative sponsors from the Judiciary Committee.

# **Education Committee News** VP – Suzanne Soules

# **2016-17 AAUW Howard County Education Programs**

The AAUW Howard County Education Committee promotes the AAUW Educational Mission by coordinating and developing opportunities to help girls and women learn about careers. We encourage a special emphasis in Science, Technology, Engineering or Math (STEM) because these are fields where women are under-represented. We do this through the following programs:

**Scholarships** are funded by the Branch's philanthropic efforts. AAUW HC awards three types of scholarships to women attending Howard Community College, regardless of their major: 1) one to help a minority or non-traditional woman student remain a student at HCC; 2) one to help a minority or non-traditional woman student matriculate to a four

year school; 3) several to student leaders to attend the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL). At this conference our recipients attend skill-building workshops, hear motivating speakers, and meet other scholarship recipients from around the county.

**Girl Power Career Fair** for middle and high school girls held annually in the spring at the Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Lab (APL) in Laurel. Its purpose is to interest girls in studies and careers in STEM fields. AAUW HC members staff a table featuring a different theme each year such as "Growing Food on Mars." APL hosts this free event with funding from other organizations and support from the APL and Math Engineering Science Achievement organization.

**Howard County STEM Festival** for K-12 students held annually in June at Howard Community College. AAUW HC staffs a table each year supporting the event's goal to stimulate and encourage student interest and parental awareness of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM). Our table supports the objectives of the organizers to tap into ALL our inner STEM abilities and demonstrate how they are used in our everyday lives.

**Hammond HS DIAMONDS Scholars,** a student group that focuses on the personal development of minority girls, promotes academic achievement with the goal of earning acceptance to college, especially for a STEM-field major. AAUW HC has partnered with DIAMONDS for five years and is working with them to develop programs that support and expand their efforts.

On November 3<sup>rd</sup>, Suzanne Soules and Kathy Schofield attended the DIAMONDS induction ceremony, where Kathy was a guest speaker. She discussed the history of AAUW and how our Howard County branch contributes to educational opportunities for women. She talked about our scholarships and our participation in Girl Power and the STEMFestival.


