Observing Equal Pay Day

April 8 is "Equal Pay Day," the symbolic day when women's earnings catch up to men's earnings from the previous year. That means it takes women about three extra months of work to make up the 23 percent difference. A new report available through the AAUW Website (www.aauw.org) provides the history of the gender pay gap as well as analysis of the effect on different categories of women. One significant finding in The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap is that women age 35-54 face a significantly wider disparity in pay than do younger women. Equal Pay Day this year falls between two anniversaries that have helped women make progress in the workplace, although much remains to be done. January 2 was the fifth anniversary of the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act, and July 2 is the 50th anniversary of Civil Rights Act.

AAUW asks you to wear red on April 8 in observance of Equal Pay Day.

AAUW Awards Five Scholarships in Honor of 50th Anniversary

The Education Committee proudly announces the winners of the AAUW-Howard County scholarships, for non-traditional women graduating from Howard Community College and beginning bachelor's degree programs at four-year institutions. This year we are celebrating the Branch's fiftieth anniversary by awarding five scholarships rather than the usual three. The two additional scholarships are named to honor the memory of long-time members Joetta Cramm and Jane Trolinger. We are very grateful to branch member Maureen Marshall, Assistant Director of the Career Links program at HCC, for her hard work in securing a record number of outstanding candidates.

Audra K. Medley is awarded the Jane Trolinger Memorial Scholarship. An L.P.N., certified firefighter, and EMT trained in anti-terrorism and hazmat operations, Audra Medley received her associate's degree in nursing from HCC in December 2013. Audra has been accepted at the University of Notre Dame of Maryland and hopes one day to start a "business focusing on health and welfare through diet and exercise."

Grace Aderogba-Olaiya is the mother of a five-yearold boy and "live[s] to be a good example to him." She has worked for more than twelve years as a specialist in medical accounts receivable. Grace will graduate from HCC this spring with an associate's degree in information technology. She has been

accepted to the University of Baltimore, where she will pursue her bachelor's degree in healthcare information systems.

Raja Chahdi is the mother of three boys and she sees continuing her education as the best way of providing a good life for them. She has maintained a B+ average in the pre-med program at HCC while also working as a pharmacy technician. She looks forward to being involved with the Women's Center at the University of Maryland College Park, where she will pursue a bachelor's degree in biology. Her ultimate goal is a medical career.

Laetitia Messi is awarded the Joetta Cramm Memorial Scholarship. She is the "single mother of four wonderful, very bright children," whom she teaches that "with help, some push, and a bit of determination, anything can be accomplished." She was volunteering at Laurel General Hospital when she found her calling to occupational therapy. Laetitia graduated from HCC in 2013 and has been accepted at Towson University, where she will start her bachelor's program this fall.

Stephanie Hoyte is also the single mother of three children. She has worked for more than twelve years at the House of Ruth as a family advocate for women and children surviving domestic violence. Stephanie has maintained a B+ average at HCC, and she will graduate this spring with an associate's degree in human services. She plans to pursue a bachelor's degree in social work at UMBC.

Each of the five winners receives a \$2000 scholarship and a year's membership in AAUW-Howard County. Whether at the Fashion Show, the New Members' Tea, or the May brunch, we hope that Branch Members will have many opportunities to congratulate them on their past achievements and their future goals.

Each year STEM volunteers flock to Hopkin's APL to share our enthusiasm for our professions with as many girls as will talk to us. Apparently, last year's count was 750 girls, impressive!

This year, our AAUW table was right out front near the registration staff, as well as near to the auditorium entrance where several special programs were being held throughout the afternoon. We were amid inestimable foot traffic--and loving it!! The girls who came through those entrance doors were enthusiastic, engaged, excited, intense, interested and ready to have fun. We were too!

Our AAUW contingency consisted of Jeannie Parr and her now infamous self-inflating Smiley-Face balloons ("stomping required"), courtesy of the American Chemical Society; Sethanne Myers, Barbara Parker, and their infinite enthusiasm; Amy Robinson and her chemistry and biology expertise; and me, Deb McLaughlin, with my two young STEM assistant helpers and a collection of visual perceptual challenges. During the afternoon, we were also joined by other AAUW members including our president, Lorraine Tropf. Together, for three hours, we all took on questions about AAUW, about baking soda and citric acid, and about neural processing of stereoscopic visual input to brain. Whew!
