Trent is the co-author of the book, **Why Must There Be Dragons?** Empowering Women to Master Their Careers Without Changing Men. The meeting is at the Ellicott City Senior Center from 7 to 9 pm.

It's no secret that men and women often communicate very differently. While we may be amused by the idea that *Men are from Mars; Women Are from Venus*, author John Grey highlights some uncomfortable truths about the abilities of men and women to communicate successfully in their personal relationships.

Unfortunately, the business world is not immune to such gender-based communication differences. How we use words, our tone of voice, patterns of speech, body language, and conversation 'rituals' often lead to misunderstanding and miscommunication between men and women . . . and to the perception of discrimination.

Have You Noticed?

AAUW has introduced a new website (<u>www.aauw.org</u>), accented by our first new logo in more than 20 years. These changes, which also include an updated tagline and a fresh color palette, are designed to place AAUW on the cutting edge of digital communications and appeal to a broad audience.

As plans for the new website unfolded, the AAUW Board of Directors decided to move forward with a new logo to accompany the updated site. The most recent logo was introduced in 1990, and it was starting to show its age, especially in an increasingly digital world.

A logo working group, composed of board members and staff, took on the task of creating the new logo. They wanted a modern, more readable typeface for the logo and a tagline that would instantly convey who we are and what we do. The new logo emphasizes the "W" as the central element of our name and work and has a more global look.

To develop the tagline, the working group tried another new trend, crowdsourcing. They posted a description of AAUW and our communications goals on **Crowdspring** and invited freelance writers from around the world to submit ideas. The process netted more than 2,000 entries and showed remarkable consensus around the themes of empowerment and AAUW's extensive history.

The working group quickly settled on "Empowering women since 1881" as the new tagline, and the board approved it unanimously in October.

Honoring the Past, Empowering the Future

As we move towards our half century celebrations, we'll take time to honor the history—both local and national—that led us here. Here are a few AAUW History Brief Facts:

1. It all began with a meeting of 17 like-minded women who had defied society's standards by earning college degrees. That was in 1881, 125 years ago.

The Association of Collegiate Alumnae, AAUW's fore bearer, is formally organized on Jan. 14, 1882, with 65 graduates of eight colleges and universities as founding members. Their purpose: to unite alumnae of different institutions in "practical education work." Wesleyan University (Conn.) and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology are admitted as charter members.

AAUW Supports STEM Education for Girls

The Education Committee hosted a very successful event at the Johns Hopkins Applied Physics Lab's **Girl Power**, which promotes STEM education and careers for women. Branch members Cynthia Cupples, Deb McLaughlin, Jean Parr and Lorraine Tropf staffed two tables, which were visited by 1,100 attendees on March 17.

AAUW-Howard County had two activities for middle- and high-school aged girls. Deb McLaughlin presented a hands-on exploration of the *Science of Perpetual Illusions*. We also distributed 600 self-inflating balloons, a donation from the American Chemical Society. The balloons were very engaging as students discovered how the products of a chemical reaction can be used for many purposes.

The event also generated interest in membership in AAUW among several adult attendees.



Education Committee News Flash! We had a very successful day on March 23 with our practice SAT. Thirty-three students from middle school to juniors in high school took the test. Our partnership with Princeton Review continues to be very productive and Vantage House provided a great venue for us. Thanks to everyone who helped.
