Shop for a Cause

Once again, AAUW has joined Macy's Shop for a Cause to help fund our community service efforts on **Saturday**, **August 25**. This is a fundraising event for our branch but it is also a great opportunity for you and your friends to save money at Macy's. For \$5 you can purchase a 25% coupon, good for regular, sale and clearance items, including home, even same on most brands usually excluded! And each \$5 gets you a chance at a \$500 gift card at Macy's! Buy a \$25 item and you have more than made up the cost of the coupon and you have contributed to AAUW Howard County's philanthropic funds.

As you know, our community service efforts include funding to support scholarships to Howard Community College (HCC) students, sending an HCC student to a leadership conference, donating to Grass Roots, donating to the Educational Opportunities Fund (EF) for fellowships and grants and the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF).

AAUW Howard County gets the entire proceeds - \$5 for each ticket – for our funds. If every member purchased two tickets (\$10), we would make over \$1000! And each member would have 2 chances to win a \$500 gift card as well as 2 25% off coupons. Members can also refer friends, relatives, co-workers, other club members, etc., to AAUW to purchase a coupon.

There are a few ways that you can participate. As we did last year, we are asking that each Branch member purchase two shopping passes. You can share one with a friend! That is just a \$10 donation. 100% of the proceeds go to the Branch's community service efforts. Here is how you can participate:

Not forgetting her roots, she has gone back to South Korea to lecture teachers, adding Japan to her circuit. Claire's pleased to see the progress women have made in Korea.

Although Claire moved to Maryland to be closer to her daughters and grandchildren, who live in New Jersey, Maryland, and Virginia, her husband, a retired chemical engineer, became a tax and investment specialist in St. Louis--or, as Claire put it--" he reinvented himself." Women of Distinction Awards Event

The Women of Distinction Awards evening, held at the University of Maryland College Park on May 31 as part of the National Conference of Collegiate Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) was inspiring and exciting. Six women were honored, and each shared her life lessons with the audience of college students and AAUW members. A consistent theme was to find your vision, believe in it and not give up when faced with setbacks. A second was the strong reminder that many women do not have the opportunity for an education. Those who do have an education have the responsibility to see that education is a privilege and to make life better for others. The most gripping examples came from honoree Noorjahan Akbar of Afghanistan, the 20-year-old co-founder of Young Women for Change, who told the audience that most women in her country cannot read or write and are subject to restrictive measures that take away their individual personhood.

Our branch sponsored Jennie Wang, one of our 2012 scholarship winners, to attend NCCWSL. The leadership workshops and networking opportunities for young leaders are outstanding. College students are interested in learning skills and having leadership opportunities. NCCWSL provides exactly that for them, and attendance has been growing year by year. Six hundred students were in attendance from across the country.

AAUW members are invited to attend this awards event, feel the excitement and see one of the ways our organization is providing opportunities for young women. Next year, I hope many of you will be there.

AAUW Maryland sponsored the event through its Barbara Fetterhoff Honorary Fund which marks the outstanding contributions that Barbara, a member of the Patuxent River Branch, has made to AAUW during her 50 years as a member.
