Remember, Record and Pass It On

aving looked at the perspectives of a variety of AAUW's past leaders, we thought it would be interesting to see what our current president thinks about the importance of celebrating milestones like our 50th branch anniversary. In addition, we wanted to understand why a current leader became involved and took on leadership roles when, by comparison with the situation 50 or even 20 years ago, there are now so many organizations and venues where women can gather, share and contribute to the community.

Our current president, Lorraine Tropf, has served our branch as both Co-Vice President for Programs and as President, which is somewhat remarkable since she only joined the branch in 2010! Ms. Tropf had prior experience with AAUW in NY, where she graduated from college as a non-traditional student, when she was 29. At that time, a neighbor took her to an AAUW meeting and within months, she was recruited to be Board Secretary. "When the President invited me over and asked if I'd be interested in a Board position. I said 'yes' without thinking too much about it." The values and initiatives of AAUW resonated with her own experience. She was very involved on the Board and in various committees for 3-4 years, until work and family demands increased and she lost touch with AAUW.

When she moved to Maryland, Lorraine worked with Dottie Mallerich, who was an AAUW member. Dottie



invited her to become a member again. "It was very similar to the NY program," she recalled, noting that while educational and professional opportunities for women have increased, the fight for equal pay continues. With the perspective of a 20+ year career administering EEO and Affirmative Action programs, Ms. Tropf saw her re-involvement in AAUW as an opportunity to continue to support the issues for which she had advocated in her career, as well as a way to connect with new friends through the wide variety of social activities offered.

Asked what she is proudest of accomplishing, Lorraine was quick to say that through the efforts of the current Board and committees, she is very proud that the Howard County branch has been able to get women excited about AAUW. "There are more

people attending meetings, more people joining committees and more activities available.' Reflecting on her presidency, she said, "board members are volunteers. It is important for them to remember to enjoy what they are doing." As we celebrate our 50th anniversary as a branch, Lorraine effusively praised the Anniversary Committee, for finding so many ways to remind us of how special it is to be part of an organization that has operated and provided help to our county continuously for 50 years. "Our success is built on the work and successes of past boards and members," she emphasized. "When you look at the archives left by those who organized our 10th or 25th or 40th anniversaries, you see the care those women took to preserve pictures and programs and documents that remind us that AAUW was important to them and AAUW was recognized as important to the community. We need to leave our own legacy for the 60th anniversary members and those who follow. We need to remember, record and pass it on."
