April Branch Meeting

The April Branch Meeting on **Tuesday**, **April 14** will feature Manda Zand Ervin, Founder and Director of the Alliance of Iranian Women.

As the head of the Alliance of Iranian Women, Manda Ervin works to bring the West's attention to the plight of Iranian women under Islamic Sharia laws. On September of 2009 she was invited to the G-8 International Conference on Violence against Women, at the Italian Foreign Ministry headquarters in Rome, Italy, where she was the featured speaker on Iran. She almost single-handedly gathered the support to pass a 2003 U.S. Senate Resolution on the human rights of the women of Iran. Ms. Ervin is frequently consulted by Members of Congress considering resolutions and legislation on Iran policy and human rights.

Ms. Ervin will be sharing history of women in Iran and their struggles against the Islamic clergies of the Arab Islamic military and later Turkish Shia occupiers. Plan to attend this informative and fascinating presentation.

Let's Celebrate Spring!

We are so lucky to be so close to Washington, DC where visitors, participants and guests from all over the world visit our nation's capital for the National Cherry Blossom Festival. This year commemorates the 103rd anniversary of the 3,000 beautiful Cherry Blossom trees that were a gift from Japan to the United States in 1912 and reminder of the close friendship and history between Japan and the United States. The cherry blossoms also symbolize revitalization after a long and severe winter.

So, I would highly recommend and encourage you to experience and enjoy Japanese culture and the beautiful cherry blossoms along the Tidal Basin during the month long celebration that started **March 20**, and will continue until **April 12**. The largest number of people attend the National Cherry Blossom Parade and Matsuri Street Festival on **April 11**, my favorite.

This celebration is also a good time to reflect on some of the challenges our country faces as we struggle to understand and live with people of a different race, religion, ethnicity, disability, and sexual orientation. As a reminder not to repeat history, The Annual Cherry Blossom Freedom Walk at the National Japanese American Memorial, an official event of the National Cherry Blossom Festival, is a historical and cultural event to raise awareness about the Japanese American experience during World War II. It highlights the vigilant role that American citizens must continue to play in preserving the Constitutional rights of all Americans. The Memorial was built as a lasting tribute to the more than 33,000 Japanese American soldiers who served with great distinction in the U.S. Military. The Memorial also pays tribute to the more than 120,000 persons of Japanese ancestry who were unjustly relocated in the American confinement sites during World War II and is also a testament to our nation's greatness that it does not fear to acknowledge its mistakes. This year's Freedom Walk was held Saturday, March 28.

ADVOCACY CORNER

Equal Pay Day

Once again we are acknowledging the symbolic day – **April 14** - when women's earnings catch up to what men make at the end of the previous year. That means it takes women about three extra months of work to make up the difference.

Women earn an average of 22% less than men with the same education and the same job. And the 22% is an average. When compared with white males, Latinas are at 46% (or 54 cents to \$1) and African American women earn 56%.

Age is also a factor – older women have a larger pay difference than younger workers. Location matters. Washington DC has the lowest percentage – in this case a good thing – at 9%. Maryland comes in third with 15 %. And dead last – with a 34% difference is Louisiana.

The Equal Pay Act was passed in 1963, over 50 years ago. The Paycheck Fairness Act and the Fair Pay Act will close some of the loopholes, if either is ever passed. AAUW asks you to wear red on April 14 in observance of Equal Pay Day.

Education Committee Update

On Sunday, March 8, the Education Committee again participated in Girl Power at the Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Laboratory. This is an annual free introductory event for middle and high school girls, to highlight careers in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM).

Jean Parr organized our efforts and coordinated with the American Chemical Society to provide the always popular and amazing self-inflating balloons, along with literature to explain what makes them inflate, information for high school level chemistry students and literature encouraging careers in chemistry. At our second table (we are just that popular) Deb McLaughlin presented her brain games and information about neuroscience and perception.

Amy Robinson and Jeffri Pierre were there to maintain some semblance of order as over 600 girls visited our exhibit and many of them didn't seem to want to leave. Lots of budding scientists at Girl Power.
