This year at the General Assembly, we had two somewhat different versions of our bill to extend parental support from age 18 to 21 for college or technical school. The Senate version (SB 264) was simpler while the House version (HB937) added factors for courts to consider. Marcia Posner and I (Bev Fallik) testified at the Senate hearing along with Kate Stevenson, AAUW State Co-President, and Linda Mahoney, former President of Maryland NOW. Michele Geckle of Carroll County joined us in testifying in the House. The Senate voted against the bill and, despite some promising discussion in the House hearing, the House version of the bill was withdrawn at the last minute, because the committee had not yet voted in time for it to go to the Senate.

Our committee has given careful thought to the various factors, both in terms of process and content, that likely contributed to the failure of these bills to pass. We, along with the Board, are leaning toward taking a pause this year to regroup, rethink and reexamine these factors and give careful consideration to our short- and long-term future activities. These could include possible alternative approaches to achieving our goal of supporting higher education legislation or diverting our energies to some other worthwhile objective. Joan Clinch and I want to thank our dedicated committee members Marcia Posner, Beth Hayden and Penny Zervos for all their ideas, energy and persistence - even when life (moving, health issues, etc.) intercedes. Likewise, we thank Linda Mahoney (NOW), Kate Stephenson (AAUW Maryland State Co-President), and our newest citizen advocate Michele Geckle, for their creativity, energy and passion. We are delighted to welcome Lucie Geinzer, our newest member and look forward to this coming year's activities. We will continue to meet on the 4th Tuesday morning of every month at 10:30 AM at Wegman's.

While a student, she has worked as a Certified Nursing Assistant and as a Certified Korean Language Interpreter, a vital skill needed in our diverse community. Sunday, March 10th, was the annual Girl Power STEM Festival at Johns Hopkins Applied Physics Laboratory. Our Education Committee was there with a display of "Star Struck: Women in Astronomy and Space." Thanks to Cathy Pelsinsky, Debbie Munley, Sethanne Howard, and Jeannie Parr we had a highly successful event. Marcia Posner donated candy, Cathy brought the telescope, Jeannie brought her son Sebastian who proved to be a great helper, and Sethanne is our PhD. Astrophysicist.

According to Elise Buckley, the coordinator for APL, attendance at Girl Power this year included over 800 kids and a total of 1,200 people. We handed out 400 self-inflating balloons thanks again to Jeannie, 275-word search and crossword puzzles on space, and about four pounds of Starburst candies! We also supported some teachers and home-schooling parents with the material from the American Chemical Society.



These girls are listening to the chemical reaction going on in the mylar balloon once they had stomped on the balloon to break the packet of citric acid. The fluid then mixed with the baking soda already in the balloon to create the chemical reaction, giving off carbon dioxide, thus inflating the balloon. The balloons get cold during this process, so the girls went home with a new vocabulary word -- "endothermic" reaction.

MESSAGE FROM AAUW NATIONAL OFFICE No In-Person National Convention in 2020

Last summer, AAUW sent members an update on 2020 convening, which outlined a strategy for a digital convening series and noted the potential for a smaller in-person event, as opposed to an AAUW national convention. During discussions on the organization's finances and operations at the recent AAUW Board of Directors meeting, the board has decided **there will be no in-person national convention or major convening in 2020.** Given the significant financial losses from previous conventions, the risk involved in holding even a smaller gathering was too great, particularly with hotel and catering costs at a premium in the Washington, D.C., area. As you know, AAUW's financial sustainability is a key part of the strategic plan.

We know many of you have been waiting on national AAUW's dates to finalize your own state and regional conventions in 2020, and we hope that this information will be helpful.

All of us deeply recognize and value the importance of bringing women together to support AAUW and its mission. If your state or regional leaders are seeking information about holding a regional convention, please reach out to the Connect team at connect@aauw.org.

We're happy to announce plans for the first virtual event in the 2020 series next January. "A 2020 Vision for Equity" will bring together a panel with leaders from politics, business and beyond to share their insights about the progress made in women's equity and the future of our movement. More information about this virtual event and the 2020 online series will be sent in the coming months.

We also want to draw your attention to upcoming changes to AAUW's national committees. The board of directors approved a new committee structure, after a review by a subcommittee of the board. The changes align AAUW's committees with best practices in nonprofit governance and AAUW's strategic priorities and needs. The changes include:

- Creation of an Advancement Committee. This committee merges the fundraising and membership functions, which are closely linked, and have been combined at the national office. The new Advancement Committee will advise the board and AAUW on fundraising strategy, membership, and new audience development. As a result, four committees will disband and be combined into the Advancement Committee as of July 1: Branch Program Resources, Fundraising, Membership and the C/U.
- Tasking the Governance Committee with making committee appointments, a process previously handled by the Committee Appointments Task Force.

We're grateful to everyone who volunteers on a national committee. Their thoughtful counsel makes AAUW stronger. The application for national committees, including the new Advancement Committee, opens on April 1.
