Branch Donates \$356 to Fueling Dragons Holiday Meal Kit Drive

Students facing hunger or food insecurity at Howard Community College are not alone. The Fueling Dragons Food Pantry provides resources to overcome food insecurity and develop lifelong healthy habits and skills. Students who wish to participate in this program must verify their current student status by registering with their student ID. After a brief orientation by someone from the pantry team, they are welcome to visit the pantry once per week to select up to 12 food or personal care items.

During the past years, our branch collected non-perishable food items at our Holiday Luncheon to donate to the Fueling Dragons Food Pantry. This year, in lieu of collecting cans and other non-perishable food items, we participated in the Fueling Dragons Holiday Meal Kit Drive. At our October Meeting, we collected \$356. This will feed seven students and their families.



What can you do to encourage literacy and promote the love of reading in young people?

- Read to them in their earliest years.
- Make sure they have a personal library of books.
- Turn off the TV and read instead.
- Schedule family reading time.
- Sign them up for a library card.

- Write stories together or separately and then share them.
- Take them to literacy-focused events at public libraries, book stores, and other locations.
- Be a role model. Make sure they know that reading is an essential and rewarding part of your daily life.

TITLE IX: ITS HISTORY, USE, ABUSE, AND IMPACT A Report on an AAUW Washington Webinar

In 1972: Congress passed Title IX, which was signed into law by President Richard Nixon. Title IX states: "No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."

This past September, AAUW Washington Online Branch presented an outstanding webinar exploring the historical evolution, current landscape, and future implications of Title IX, with a focus on its impact on gender equity in education, athletics, and beyond. The panel, featuring scholars in the fields of political science, athletics, and student affairs, provided attendees with a deeper understanding of the legal, cultural, and political dimensions of Title IX from its origins to recent developments. Panelists shared insights on enforcement trends, lived experiences, and strategies for upholding gender equity in the face of evolving interpretations and challenges.

Here are just a few insights I gained from the session:

In 1970 (prior to Title IX's passage), women earned just 11% of bachelor's degrees (compared to 57% today), and the gender pay gap was 40%.

Current statistics:

- 94% of female C-suite executives played collegiate sports.
- 40% of collegiate teams are coached by women.
- Nationally there are one million more male student athletes than female athletes.
- Only 6% of sports research focuses on women.
- Title IX has often been enforced begrudgingly.

Long-term benefits of women participating in sports at a young age:

- Better overall health
- More total years of education
- Higher income and accumulated wealth
- A more collaborative approach to work

What AAUW branches can do to monitor Title IX:

- Know the law
- Download local Title IX statistical reports

- Offer branch support to schools by engaging school boards and administrators and supporting student-led efforts
- Partner with advocacy organizations (National Women's Law Center, Girls Inc., LWV, ACLU, Women's Sports Foundation, etc.)
- Monitor and report non-compliance
